Fixing Stuff, Creating Community & Repairing the World

New Paltz Climate Change Solutions Meetup now has 78 members! This is



our seventh event so far and will feature the Repair Café. The repair movement worldwide is at the forefront of the revolution to rethink our material world. All over the world people are pooling their resources, sharing information and learning how to be more than consumers. We are learning to be fixers, and we are starting to fix our world. We are fighting for the right to repair the things we own, for policies that require eco-design of all new products, and for the just transition to a circular economy. In taking up repair, we prompt a conversation and inquiry into the ethics and practice of care--of things, yes, but also of each other, our environment and our communities. In this session, we will look at how to ditch the throwaway economy and build more resilient communities. To fix is to learn.

To see how creative, vital and international the repair movement is, search repair on Instagram. There are 1,600 Repair Cafes in 33 countries: free community meeting places to bring a beloved but broken item to be repaired by an expert who is also your neighbor. They extend the useful life of tons of items every month, but the real significance is the signal they send: We are better off when we see our own community in the midst of cooperation, creativity and decency, where goals are achieved and positive outcomes realized. This idea is eminently replicable and will encourage climate change solutions at every level.



John Wackman will be our presenter. John organized the first Repair Café in the region in New Paltz in 2013. He is the coordinator, communicator and cheerleader for Repair Cafes in the Hudson Valley, now active in more than 40 communities in 12 counties in the Hudson Valley, Catskills and Capital region. His book Repair Revolution, coauthored with Elizabeth Knight, will be published in April 2020 by New World Library.

CCA Update (CCA is Community Choice Aggregation)

The Welcome/Opt-out letter that will be mailed to every eligible home and small business in the Town and Village of New Paltz is in the process of being modified and approved by the Supervisor and Mayor. We are told that letter will be mailed out sometime between Election Day and mid-November. Once those letters go out, our one month opt-out period will begin. This is when Hudson Valley Energy will be especially out and about in both the Town and Village to help answer people's questions and process opt-outs. They will continue to hold weekly community-hosted office hours on Mondays, 12:30-1:30, now in Village Hall. They are also required to host two events each in the Town of New Paltz and the Village of New Paltz during that time period. The following events are tentatively scheduled:



Sign Up for Community Solar Now!

Are you aware that there is a community solar part of the CCA? If you don't already have solar panels on your property, you can sign up for 10% additional savings on your electric bill and earn the town/village money towards a sustainability grant. This new solar farm is now live! Please consider signing up for the additional community solar through this site. The only way New Paltz receives the sustainability grant money is if you follow the link provided here: https://www.hudsonvalleycommunitypower.com/solar



This community solar project is through Nexamp and is located in Rochester, New York and is now live! What does that mean for you? If you sign up, you will be helping to deliver clean, renewable energy generated by the sun to the electricity grid. You'll start seeing solar credits applied to your Central Hudson bill in the next 2-3 months. Please note that any unused credits will roll over from month to month and will never expire. Once they confirm that the credits have been transferred to your Central Hudson account, you'll receive an invoice from Nexamp for 90% of the credit value that you received on your electricity bill. This means you'll be saving up to 10% on your annual electricity cost.

Solar at the New Paltz Landfill

Hurricanes, flooding, drought and forest fires are all happening with greater frequency as a result of climate change. These trends can be slowed by reducing our use of fossil fuels. Displacing our own need for fossil fuels through the increased use of local, clean, renewable power such as solar is a proven, clean and economically friendly way of being better stewards of the environment when faced with these undeniable greenhouse gas threats.



New Paltz now has the opportunity to host a solar array capable of providing almost 25% of the residential power needed in our community by leasing municipally owned space at the now closed landfill site at the far end of Clearwater Road near the Thruway. New York's new renewable energy goals are now 70% by 2030; this project is an excellent way for our community to make a meaningful contribution toward that goal while providing us with clean, local power.

A well-established and reputable solar company that has been vetted and critically reviewed has proposed a solar installation that would provide electricity for the equivalent of more than 1,300 homes. The company would have responsibility for building, maintaining, operating and ultimately removing the equipment when it ceases to operate, decades from now.

The surface of our closed landfill is not large enough to support all of these resiliency-building solar panels. Thus, the solar developer was asked to consider what could be built in an adjacent and limited area to optimize the solar potential and use of already existing electrical infrastructure that is available at the site. The resulting proposal includes tree removal of less than 17 acres that are adjacent to the landfill and the current County Waste Transfer Station.

While losing trees is generally not desirable, there is a strong case for the use of this limited number of disturbed acres - such as the clean energy that will displace fossil fuels, and the revenue benefits it will provide for the community - particularly in light of its already impacted location at the edge of the landfill and next to the active County Waste Transfer Station. The necessary area is small in scale in relation to large blocks of surrounding, deeper forest. Peer reviewed calculations show that the carbon lost by removing this number of acres of trees in forest of this type would be offset by the solar panels in less than three years of their expected minimum 25-year operation. By installing solar facilities in this location, in addition to the landfill space, there will be less need to install large-scale solar panels on important agricultural lands, more critically endangered grassland habitats or the iconic viewscapes that define our community.

As the committee of volunteers working on this project, we are committed to refining the proposal further to reduce the loss of trees, to mitigate impacts and to maintain a high level of solar power from the landfill site. We are confident that there will be a "sweet spot" for balancing these related but separate concerns resulting in a project that can meet many objectives with few impacts.

As we pursue a cleaner and more resilient energy future for New Paltz, we urge the community to keep an open mind and to recognize that success will include carefully weighing, considering and acting on our options for meeting the climate crisis challenges that face our community, state, nation and the planet.
