

If you are a New Paltz resident, please turn over your ballot to vote Yes on New Paltz Local Law Number One on the ballot this November. Local Law Number One will establish a dedicated fund to protect clean drinking water, working farms, wildlife habitat, and natural areas in New Paltz. Voting yes is climate smart. Voting yes will protect the New Paltz we love for future generations before it's too late.

- Local Law Number One will not raise local property taxes.
- Revenue comes from a one-time, 1.5 % real estate transfer tax paid by buyers of properties.
- There will be an exemption on the first \$245,000 of the price, which will help first-time home buyers.

Ongoing Project Updates

• Climate Smart Resiliency Planning Tool

The Climate Smart Resiliency Planning Tool and report that was generated by Cornell Cooperative Extension can be accessed on the Climate Smart webpages on both the Town and Village websites. The Climate Smart Task Force is identifying opportunities for implementation from the report to discuss further with the Town and Village Boards.

Natural Resource Inventory

The Natural Resource Inventory (NRI) subteam has received the penultimate set of maps and the draft report from the consultants for review and comments. The NRI team will meet by Zoom with the consultants on Nov 10 to continue finalization of these documents.

• 100-year Floodplain Mapping

The Woodwell Climate Organization (formerly Woods Hole Research Center) presented the final draft of their report to the Task Force on Oct 21. The findings of this project will be presented to the Town and Village Boards at their joint meeting on Nov 4. In summary, the report states that inland floods are some of the most devastating natural disasters and are expected to worsen under climate change due to the intensification of extreme precipitation. In this study present and future flood risk in New Paltz, NY, is examined through changes in the 1-in-100 year and 1-in-500 year flood events. Future rainfall and streamflow are estimated for two time periods, 2041-2060 (mid-21st century)

and 2071-2090 (late 21st century), using a regional climate model and river-reach scale hydrologic model.

The output of these simulations show that the historical 100-year rainfall event is 1.5x as likely in 2041-2060 and 4x as likely in 2071-2090. The historical 100-year streamflow event is 2x as likely in 2041-2060 and 3.7x as likely in 2071-2090. Even greater changes in frequency were calculated for the 500-year rainfall and streamflow events. Using these estimates as inputs into a flood model reveal significant increases in flood risk across New Paltz. The total flooded area for the 100-year event increases by 7% by mid-21st century and 20% by late-21st century. The number of buildings flooded by the 100-year event increases by 12% by mid-21st century and 34% by late-21st century. There are also increases, although smaller, in the future periods for the 500-year event.

As a member of Hudson Valley Community Power, the Town and Village of New Paltz are

supporting a community solar program that increases their community's access to 100% renewable electricity, supports local development of renewable energy, all while lowering the electricity costs of their residents and small businesses. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Town of New Paltz has chosen to specifically raise money for local COVID-19 relief efforts, through enrollments in this community solar program.

For each enrollment in the community solar program, the Program Administrator partner (Joule Community Power) will donate \$50 to Family of New Paltz. So far, the Town of New Paltz has raised \$2,300 for Family of New Paltz. We are setting a goal of raising \$3,000 total by December

1st, 2020. In addition to the Town's efforts, each community solar enrollment in the Village of New Paltz will raise \$50 to support a future local sustainability project.

Community solar allows both residents and small businesses to tap into the benefits of solar without needing to install their own panels. If you have your own solar panels or are already subscribed to a solar farm, then you already receive solar credits and are not eligible to enroll in this community solar program. If your community is participating in the Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) program, you can still enroll in community solar. CCA and community solar work well together and increase your savings, while supporting the development of local renewable energy. Any home or small business in Central Hudson territory can enroll.

Hudson Valley Community Power will be hosting a virtual information session and Q&A about the program on Thursday, November 12th from 6:00 – 7:00 PM. Representatives from Joule, Hudson Valley Community Power and the Town of New Paltz will be there. We Have a PPE Problem... a Pandemic of Plastics Everywhere

The response to the global pandemic caused by the novel coronavirus seems to have created a situation where people and communities have reversed course on efforts to reduce the ubiquity of single use plastic. Yet a <u>statement</u> signed by 119 scientists from 18 different countries including epidemiologists, virologists, biologists, chemists and doctors, all agree that reusable cups, bags and containers are perfectly safe to use as long as people employ simple and basic hygiene. Evidence indicates that the virus spreads primarily from inhaling aerosolized droplets, rather than through contact with surfaces, the scientists say. The notion of plastics as a safer alternative to reusable containers is a myth perpetuated by the <u>plastics</u> industry. To keep people safe and protect our planet, we should listen to the best available science instead of underhanded marketing from the plastic industry. The promotion of unnecessary single-use plastics to decrease exposure to the coronavirus negatively impacts the environment, water systems, and potential food supply compared to the safe use of reusable bags, containers and utensils. So what can you do right now? We all want to support local restaurants so here are some suggestions from Iris Bloom when you order for pick up:

- **Bring** bamboo cutlery plus a variety of reusables in a variety of shapes and sizes
- Ask ahead (before ordering)
- Avoid places that will not allow reusables and serve in single-use plastic
- Confirm "no plastic" at the time of ordering
- *Speak* kindly to the server
- If anything, including water, is going to be served in single-use plastic, "just say no."

• Be kind and supportive of managers, servers, etc. throughout and tip at least 20% -- all the places where I go, this is appreciated because servers, also, are experiencing emotional pain at being "part of the plastic problem" and they don't like it and they like positive solutions.

NY for TCI is a campaign led by public interest organizations, businesses, and individuals demanding healthier, more equitable, sustainable, affordable, and accessible transportation solutions for all New Yorkers through a regional Transportation and Climate Initiative (TCI) program. TCI is a regional "capand-invest" program proposed by New York, 11 neighboring states (Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Virginia, and Vermont), and the District of Columbia that would limit and reduce transportation pollution, and invest in communities to provide better, cleaner, and safer transportation solutions in urban, rural, and suburban areas of New York.

The TCI program would set the region's first cap, or limit, on transportation-sector carbon pollution and require oil companies that supply polluting transportation fuels like gasoline and diesel to reduce the pollution they cause over time. The TCI program would also require oil companies to pay for the pollution their products cause, generating billions of dollars for investment in better, cleaner transportation solutions. New York and the other states would each decide how best to use their share of these payments to support instate and local transportation solutions that benefit residents.
