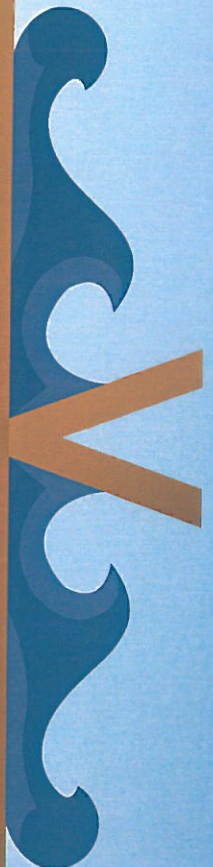
To Susan Jimet,

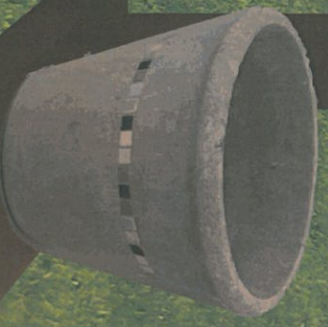
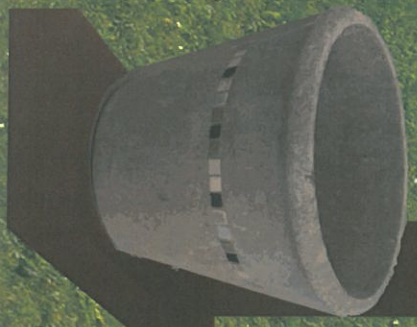

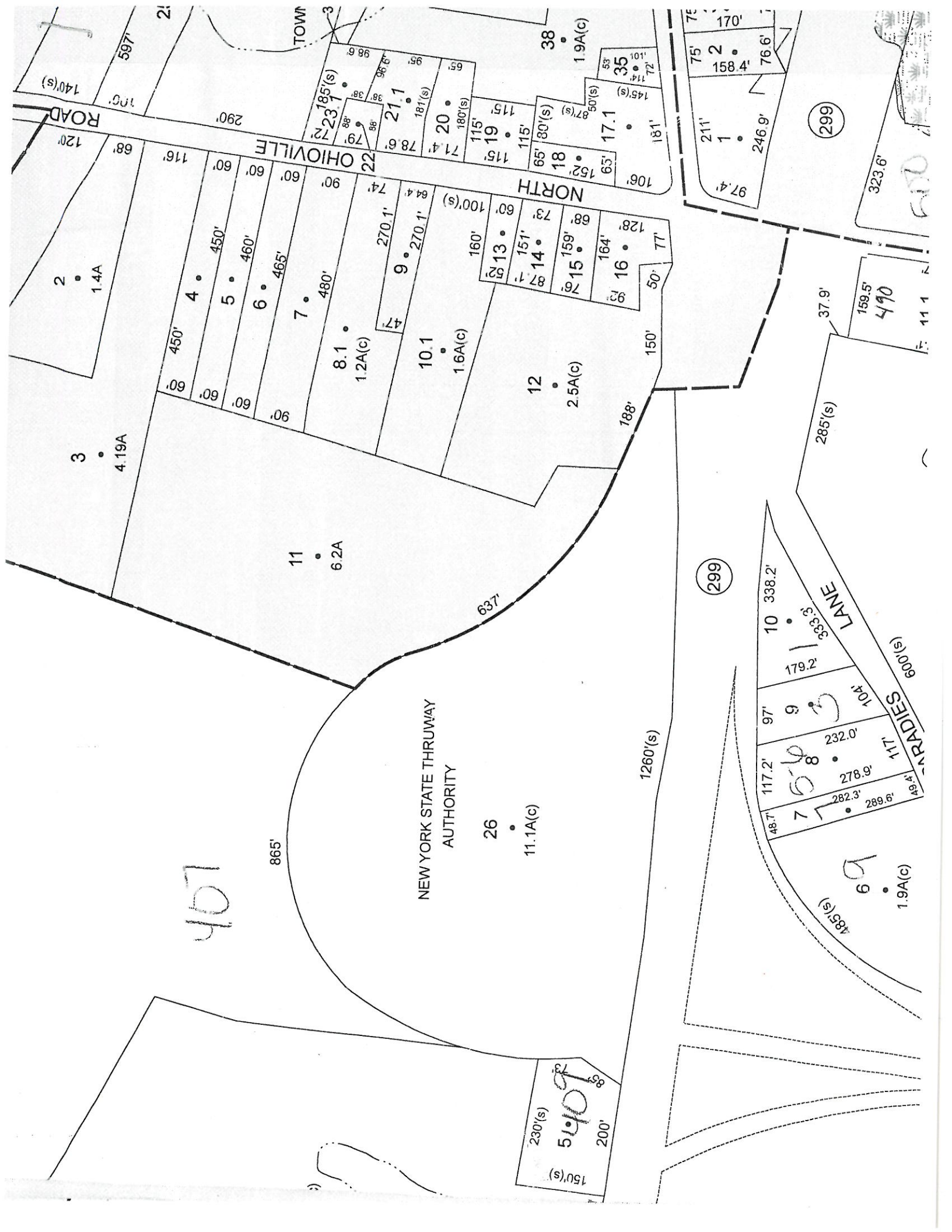
