A SHORT REPORT ON THE APRIL 24 MEETING: ULSTER COUNTY COMMUNITIES ON THE MOVE With Jeff Olson, Dennis Doyle, and Peter Karis

I attended in person, while others of the Bike/Ped Committee followed remotely.

It was a worthwhile and well-attended event. It was obvious that most of the crowd knew each other.

The main issues seem to be: Non-motorized transportation, ecological sustainability, complete streets, complete bike/ped networks (beyond recreational trails), good panning, civic engagement, political power, and popular support.

The consciousness and awareness is out there, and close by. What's before us now is how to bring it home and into effect in New Paltz, where we have so far to go. The electeds seem generally on our side, but of course there's competition for public funds.

It was apparent to me that "The Map" is all important as the monument and guarantee of planning. We have to plan ahead, and plan idealistically, so that gradually, step-bystep we can arrive a complete bike/ped network for sustainable, useful, and convenient non-motorized transportation. And that means a comprehensive Map!

Kingston has just published its own *Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan*, which provides a great blueprint for what a Plan can look like and do.
