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## Presenting the Office for Community Wellness: An introduction and overview of the department

Welcome! The Office for Community Wellness (OCW) is a unique, innovative department within the Town of New Paltz designed and operated by Phoenix R. Kawamoto, Community Education Coordinator, for the Town of New Paltz. This department works with multiple service providers, organizations, and community sectors, providing information, skills, and support to enhance the quality of life for those who call New Paltz home. This has become increasingly important now, as individuals are living through a very stressful time of change (post-pandemic), economic hardship, divisiveness, and uncertainty. Within a broader content, our country is experiencing a national mental health crisis, long-standing opioid overdose epidemic, and the more-silent epidemic of isolation and loneliness.

The OCW provides many different community activities, events, and programs with the conscious intention of creating opportunities for community members of all ages, backgrounds, and life experiences to be together in community. Human beings are social beings who need to feel safe, supported, and valued. We need affirming spaces, places, and relationships where we feel like we belong and are part of something.

Lastly, the OCW through the work of the Community Education Coordinator (CEC) is dedicated to helping individuals within New Paltz connect with available resources that can reduce the risk of more serious and challenging impacts that often occur when someone is coping with mental health challenges, a substance use disorder, and other life stressors. Another aspect of the work of the CEC is to help identify barriers that get in the way of someone's ability to access those supports.

This annual report provides a thorough overview of the OCW and the unique role of the CEC, while offering the reader a clear picture of the scope of services provided, the expanding web of community support and involvement, and the extensive network of organizational support from across the county, region, and state.

The challenges mentioned earlier are complex and require a tremendous amount of energy, time, resources, and commitment.

The Office for Community Wellness is a department of one individual striving to:

- Strengthen the community's "safety net,"
- Help people access what they need,
- Work with others to design and implement programs to fill identified gaps in services, and
- Reduce both the level and rate of harmful impact of risk occurring in New Paltz.

# Presenting the Office for Community Wellness: An introduction and overview of the department

New Paltz ingenuity: The Comptroller and Town Board of New Paltz worked with Ulster County Government to create the Community Education Coordinator position within the final quarter of 2016. The primary reason for this innovative effort was to sustain the vital community outreach work and level of community support that had been achieved during the Town's 5-year federally funded Drug-Free Communities (DFC) grant project which was ending on December 31, 2016. This substance abuse prevention grant project was managed by Phoenix Kawamoto (March 2012-December 2016) who had created and implemented several innovative approaches that were well-received and highly valued by members of the community. To date, we are not aware of any other community within the region or state that has a position or department like the Office for Community Wellness.

Mr. Kawamoto has managed two (2) DFC grant projects within Ulster County and has more than 35 years of experience within the field of Substance Abuse Prevention. The work of his department and within his role as Community Education Coordinator are informed by:


- Decades of professional experience,
- A combination of evidence-based best practices and promising approaches,
- Professionally recognized theoretical frameworks, and
- Local data collection sources and input from key stakeholders, service providers, parents, youth, and community members representing 12 sectors of the community.

Mr. Kawamoto was appointed as the Community Education Coordinator (CEC) and began serving the New Paltz community as such on January 1, 2017. Initially, the CEC position was part-time; it was 30 hours per week from 2017-2019 and increased to 35 hours per week in the year 2020. The Town Board of New Paltz made this position a full 40 hours per week position in response to impacts the community was experiencing from the opioid overdose crisis, mental health crisis, and the Covid-19 pandemic.

# Presenting the Office for Community Wellness: An introduction and overview of the department

It takes a community: The science of prevention has demonstrated that successful community change can be achieved through the active participation and involvement of community members and organizations that represent 12 sectors within the community. Here is a diagram of those sectors as identified by numerous national organizations and governmental agencies, including the United States' Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP). Active participation from all 12 sectors is required of all federally funded DFC grant projects, and was well-established here during the grant period.

As the reader moves through this report, they will see how participation and community involvement has grown and shifted in the seven years this department has been in existence. (See p.5)



**Effective Strategies for Community Change:** The work of the OCW utilizes four of seven evidence-based, effective strategies for community change that are best suited for this department and the capacity of a sole individual. These strategies serve as guiding framework to address local needs and concerns, as well as work with community members and partner organizations to co-create community solutions or desired outcomes. The chart below offers the reader a brief description of the nationally recognized strategies for community change.

# Understanding the Role & Responsibilities of the Community Education Coordinator

A multi-facetted, position: The title of Community Education Coordinator (CEC) only reflects one small component of the work being done within the Town of New Paltz. Phoenix Kawamoto, CEC, works with organizations and services providers to provide <u>free</u> evidence-based trainings (i.e., Youth Mental Health First Aid, safeTALK, etc.), as well as numerous Narcan trainings (as discussed in detail on page 10). Please note there is a free Mental Health First Aid Training on April 13th. The flier complete with registration information is located in Appendix A (p.22).

The majority of Mr. Kawamoto's work involves the coordination, planning, and implementation of prevention activities, events, and programs contained within the chart below. The updated services diagram of the roles and responsibilities of the CEC for 2024 is provided in the first page of the Appendix B (p. 24).


#### The OCW's Record of Expansion and Community Support



**7 years of growth and expansion:** This second pie chart illustrates the percentage levels for each of the 12 community sectors involved with the work of the OCW in 2023.







#### **Community Contributions and Support**

**Community-funded expansion:** Civic groups, educational foundations, law enforcement organizations, faith groups, governmental organizations, local businesses, parents and other local community members, as well as other service providers have donated countless hours of their time, expertise, goods, and services. Additionally, they have funded a robust expansion of community events and activities to support the community during the Covid-19 pandemic, as well as during this post-pandemic period. The OCW has received \$32,241 in financial support since 2017. The timeline below illustrates the growth in community contributions over the past seven years.





A brief overview: This section of the report will provide the reader with some background information as it relates to the history of this work team, as well as the ever-changing conditions and challenges of the opioid overdose epidemic. The reader will learn about the local response and the numerous networks our team is connected to. Lastly, the author will share highlights from 2023 and the creative initiatives in New Paltz, how our work supports the County, region, and beyond. This will be followed by several Ulster County opioid overdose slides that illustrate the scope of this crisis on a local level, while helping the reader better understand the scope and breadth of our response.

The opioid overdose epidemic continues to grow and foster heartbreak locally and nationally. Phoenix Kawamoto has served as the lead coordinator of the New Paltz Opioid Overdose Prevention and Response Team since its inception in 2013 as part of the DFC grant project in New Paltz. At that time, Mr. Kawamoto was the project director and prescription opioids were one of four substances of concern that the GNPCP had identified as part of its focus and work plan. He reached out to coalition members and professionals from numerous community sectors who were deeply troubled and wanted to become involved. Several of the original members remain on the team and the team has expanded greatly over the years of the opioid epidemic.

An ever-changing epidemic: Over the past 10-12 years, the opioid overdose epidemic has changed dramatically and claimed the lives of too many within the community, our county, and nation. The number of family members and friends, as well as communities as a whole, that are forever changed by these painful losses is beyond measure.

The factors that have created and continue to fuel this epidemic are complex and too numerous to mention in this report. Mr. Kawamoto continues to work tirelessly with a dedicated team to implement evidence-based harm reduction practices (i.e. Narcan training, providing fentanyl test strips, etc.) as well as create innovative strategies, materials, and tools that are being replicated within Ulster County, Columbia County, and Delaware County.

Mr. Kawamoto continues to help those seeking his assistance. Sometimes that involves connecting a human service organization in Albany connect with a local provider of necessary supplies; other times he is offering support to coalition and organizational leaders seeking guidance on how to replicate what has been built here, like the Dallas Area Drug Prevention Partnership located in North Texas. Every community has its own unique culture and conditions, but by working together and sharing what we have learned along the way, we can help one another and make a difference.

**Help is a click or call away:** As mentioned previously, there are numerous organizations local, county, and state, who are working together to provide support, referral, intervention, treatment, and harm reduction supplies free of charge and no questions asked.

- Indoor Emergency Naloxone Stations: There are currently 18 indoor emergency stations located within the Village and Town of New Paltz. These locations also have a window sticker with the QR code for the opioid overdose prevention website listed above to help members of the community obtain a free kit.
- Community On-The-Spot Narcan Training: There are monthly Narcan trainings taking place on the 3rd Tuesdays of the month within the Steinberg Room at the Elting Library, located at 93 Main Street in New Paltz. These trainings are available when the New Paltz Open-Air Market is not in operation. The New Paltz Opioid Overdose Prevention and Response Team (NPOOPRT) provides weekly Narcan training at the open-air market from 10am-1pm on Sundays during the months of June October.



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- On-Campus On-The-Spot Narcan Training: Jaclyn Cirello, Associate Director for Student Wellbeing and Prevention Education, provides monthly Narcan trainings at the SUNY New Paltz Campus. Ms. Cirello has worked tirelessly with the other departments on campus and other community organizations to coordinate efforts on campus and provide resources to students, faculty, staff, and community members. - Free Fentanyl Test Strips and Xylazine Test Strips: Please visit any of the following New Paltz locations to obtain free test strips to reduce the risk of an opioid overdose: New Paltz Town Hall (52 Clearwater Road), New Paltz Community Center (3 Veterans Drive), Family of New Paltz (51 North Chestnut Street), New Paltz Village Hall (25 Plattekill Avenue), and the New Paltz Youth Program (220 Main Street).

Another example of New Paltz collaboration and ingenuity: In January of 2022, the members of the NPOOPRT met to discuss strategies, emerging trends, areas of concern, and brainstorm possible improvements that the team could make. It was during this meeting that Chief Lucchesi proposed an innovative idea; an outdoor emergency Naloxone station that we could install in various locations within the community that were more remote. The group enthusiastically agreed that this could make an important difference in those crisis situations where seconds count.

Mr. Kawamoto began searching for possible prototype designs and reached out to Jimmy Wipf, a member of the Bruderhof Community in nearby Rifton, New York, who has been a long-standing community partner in the prevention work of both the GNPCP and the OCW. Working with, Leonard Hofer, one of the community's craftsmen, they built an insulated prototype. Mr. Kawamoto began researching add-on components to enhance functionality and made the units easily identifiable with bilingual decals.





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**Generosity abounds:** The Bruderhof built and donated 10 outdoor stations that were painted by the OCW and installed at various locations within the Town of New Paltz by Town of New Paltz Buildings and Grounds Department, and at several locations within the Village of New Paltz by their Department of Public Works. The accompanying metal signage was generously donated by the Wallkill Valley Land Trust and the building materials required for installation were provided by the OCW through financial donations received from community members committed to supporting the OCW's opioid overdose prevention efforts.

These exterior units are monitored regularly by members of the New Paltz Police Department and the CEC.

This NPOOPRT initiative has become a model for Ulster County. Funds received from the NYS Opioid Settlement enabled the purchase of additional units that have been installed in communities across the county. This effort was coordinated through the O.R.A.C.L.E. team at the Ulster County Sheriff's Department who is providing ongoing support.

In addition, Margaretville Hospital located in Delaware County, New York, is also planning to replicate this initiative within their county through a grant they received and with the help of builders in their community.







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Proud to serve with a such a dedicated team: The New Paltz Opioid Overdose Prevention and Response Team (NPOOPRT) is comprised of local first responders, human service organizations, health professionals, treatment providers, and youth workers. The logos in the banner above represent the core team. There are other supportive and participating organizations who donate the use of their space, such as Elting Memorial Library, or serve as a community location where individuals who have utilized the website for training and prefer to pick up their free kit rather than have it delivered. Dedrick's Pharmacy is one of those community locations.

Additionally, there are numerous organizations involved in this effort who participate in numerous community outreach events, such as our annual Recovery Fest in September, or help with the delivery of Narcan kits and harm reduction supplies to areas outside of this department's service area and reach.

The NPOOPRT is part of an established network that has a 10-county reach!

Data snapshot of local Narcan distribution in 2023: Here is a data snapshot providing the numbers of individuals trained, free kits provided, and the numbers of kits utilized/replenished at our new outdoor emergency Naloxone stations within the first 7 months of their operation:

Our partner organizations on the SUNY New Paltz Campus installed emergency Narcan stations in every residence hall and numerous additional locations on campus, held monthly Narcan trainings on campus while classes were in-session, and provided numerous training for RA's, faculty, and student groups.

A few important words about the data: As mentioned earlier in this report, this section of the report is focused on opioid overdose data made available from the Ulster County Health Department. The data slide images provided on pages 14-17 were provided by Kelly Perry, Data Surveillance Coordinator, at the Ulster County Department of Health. Ms. Perry has provided our team with valuable information and as well as important reminders pertaining to the limitations of the data. For example, this data is from the Ulster County Medical Examiner's Office and strictly provides the numbers of opioid overdose deaths that occurred within a municipality. It does not account for loved ones who died from an overdose outside of Ulster County.

The author is including this data in order to inform the community of the scope of the problem, while also offering some context for the strategies being utilized by our team. The data available has become increasingly helpful due to improvements in data collection and reporting. Despite its limitations, we are able to identify important trends in locations, identify where more resources may be needed, and the impact of current prevention and response efforts being utilized.

Impact of the Pandemic and Isolation: As you look at the slides provided, please take note of the years when we were experiencing the Covid-19 pandemic and the resulting period of prolonged isolation. This isolation had a significant immediate impact, as an individual experiencing an opioid overdose cannot self-administer Naloxone. This situation was made even more dangerous by the physical isolation many people were in to prevent infection. This was a very difficult for our families and communities, as well as the teams of professionals and responders within New Paltz and Ulster County who were desperately trying to keep people safe. Ulster County was fortunate to receive additional support, including financial resources to help us mobilize and create a multi-county network of determined, dedicated people. Our 10-county network still exists and we help one another with the challenges that remain.


Local conditions often change in an instant and tragedies strike despite the interventions of family, loved ones, and the vast networks of professionals working with them. The numbers contained within the slides presented here represent loved ones lost. Many of us, like those of you reading this, have lost friends, family members, neighbors, co-workers, etc. due to the disease of addiction and/or substance use disorders.




**Slide #1:** This first slide illustrates the number of non-fatal overdoses (in blue) and the number of fatal overdoses (in red) per year in Ulster County from 2018-2023.



**Slide #2:** The slide below illustrates the percentage of overdoses that resulted in a fatality during each of those years in Ulster County. Multiple strategies have been implemented, such as making free Naloxone and other harm reduction resources available; the percentage of fatalities is decreasing.




**Slide #3:** The slide below illustrates the percentage of opioid overdose fatalities within the four (4) geographic regions of Ulster County. New Paltz is one of nine municipalities that comprise the Central and Southern Tier.



**Points for Consideration:** As you look at this slide image, you will see how conditions and impact changed dramatically for the Central and Southern Tier region, of which New Paltz is a part. Our geographic region of the county went from having the lowest percentage of opioid overdose deaths in 2020 to greatest number.

The City of Kingston is experiencing a consistent decline in opioid overdose deaths after a comprehensive prevention plan utilizing multiple evidence-based strategies across multiple sectors was implemented. The NPOOPRT has been utilizing a similar multi-pronged approach and we are watching carefully.


**Slide #4:** The slide below illustrates the number of opioid overdose fatalities that occurred within the towns that comprise the Central and Southern Tier region of Ulster County over a 6-year period. The color yellow is used for New Paltz.



It is important for the reader to know that upon learning that Ulster County had the 2nd highest opioid overdose fatality rate in New York State (not including NYC), Michael Hein, the County Executive of Ulster County, mobilized a county-wide multi-disciplinary task force to: (a) identify gaps within our safety net as a county, and, (b) research best practices from across the country that could be replicated here. We met regularly and worked feverishly to provide harm reduction resources, enhance access to effective treatment, and a multitude of other strategies to reduce access and availability to prescription opioids that were unattended or being over-prescribed. Thankfully, we had an extensive network in place when the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic occurred.

As you look at this chart you will see that our efforts in New Paltz appear to be working, as the number of opioid overdose fatalities occurring New Paltz has been consistently decreasing here.

**Slide #5:** The slide below illustrates the number of opioid overdose fatalities that New Paltz along with our closest neighboring communities experienced in 2023.



While we are relieved to see the numbers of opioid overdose fatalities continue to decline here in New Paltz, we remain vigilant and steadfast in our efforts. We continue to provide Narcan training and other harm reduction supplies at multiple community locations, as well as through the opioid overdose prevention website.

On behalf of the Office for Community Wellness and the New Paltz Opioid Overdose Prevention and Response Team, we ask for your continued support and assistance. 
CEC Service Overview Diagram - 2024
